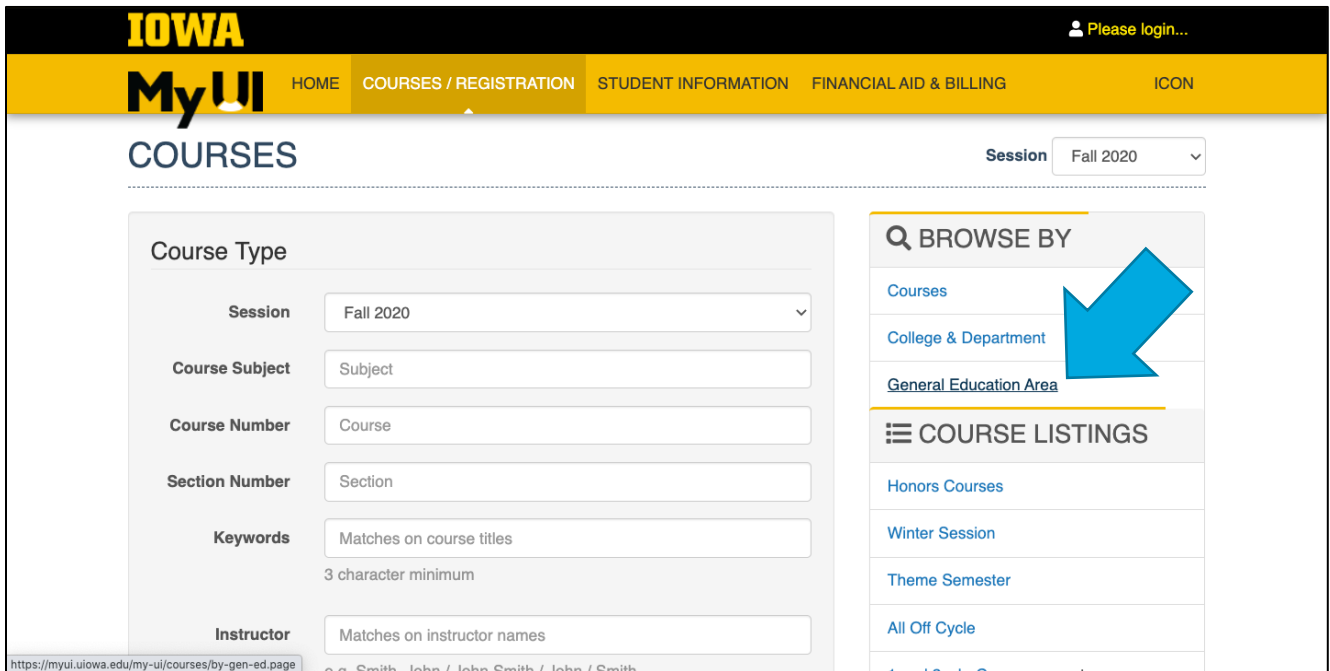


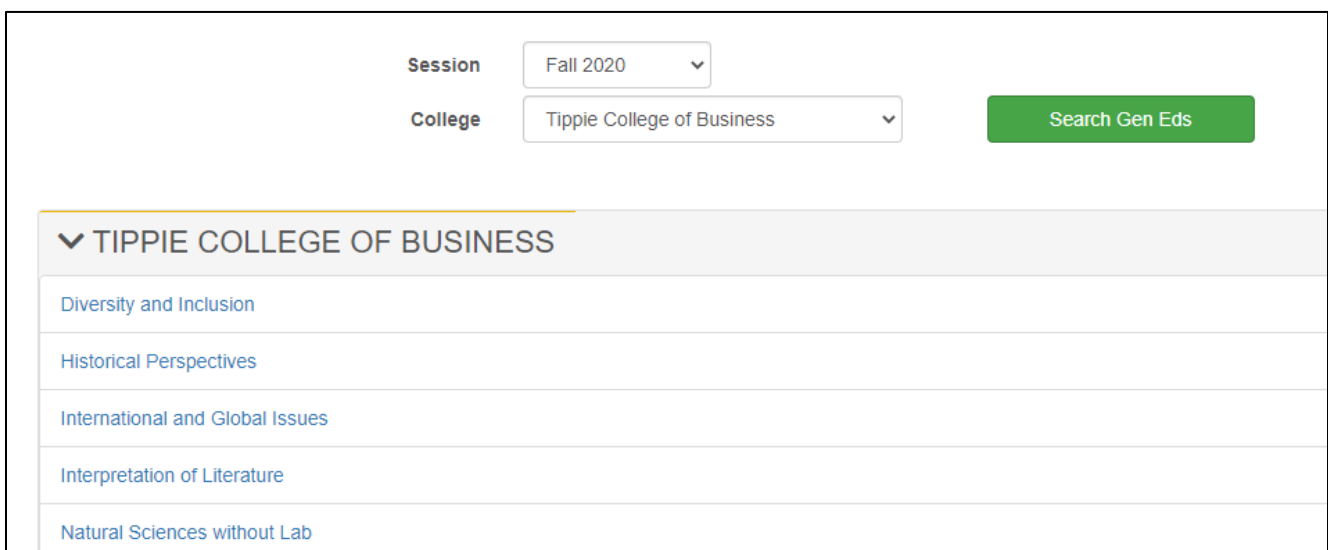

How to find General Education courses in MyUI

1. Open MyUI. You do not need to be logged in. Navigate to the Courses/Registration page. On the right side of the page under Browse By, select **General Education Area**.
